**Four rabbis speak personally of their relationship to the Land and the State of Israel**

Rabbis Geoffrey Basik, Floyd Herman, Chaim Landau, and Ron Shulman

American Jews have historically had a love affair with Israel. From pre-Statehood, to the Six-Day War, to the Yom Kippur War, to the Intifadas, to the politics surrounding a two-state solution, Jews in the U.S. have taken their Zionism seriously as evidenced by their generous financial support for the Jewish State and their political activism inside and outside the Beltway.

Just as Rabbi Loeb's Zionist ideals were idiosyncratic, so too each of our panelists' expression of Zionism and love for Israel is different. Each wrestles with the tough moral and political problems posed by the "matzav," the "situation" facing Israelis today. Each relates to the Land and the State through their different lenses, upbringing and life experiences in Israel. Join us for a lively, provocative and thoughtful discussion that will challenge your own feelings and thinking about Israel.

**8:45-9:15 p.m.**

Rabbi Mark Loeb (z"l) of Beth El Congregation was a multi-faceted spiritual leader, scholar and aficionado of operatic music. Cantors Renata Braun (Temple Oheb Shalom), Thom King (Beth El Congregation), Manny Perlman (Chizuk Amuno Congregation), and Robbie Solomon (Baltimore Hebrew Congregation) will present a multi-lingual tribute to Rabbi Loeb. Their presentation will reflect the richness of Jewish music through the ages. In addition, Rabbi Steven Schwartz and Rabbi Amy Scheinerman will offer brief *Divrei Torah* interspersed between musical selections.

**Session One 7:30-8:15 p.m.**

**#1 The Jewish Khazars**

Rabbi Steven M. Fink

(L, T, I / B, IN, A)

“Of all the astonishing experiences of the widely dispersed Jewish people none was more extraordinary than that concerning the Khazars.” From the seventh through 10th centuries, an independent Jewish State, between the lower Volga and the Northern Caucasus, was a beacon of hope even as Jews were persecuted elsewhere in Christian Europe. The Khazars stopped the advance of Islam and communally converted to Judaism. This is the story that stirred the imagination of the Jewish people for centuries.

**#2 Is Divorce a Sin? Or Can it Be For Some a Mitzvah?  
Let's Get started!**

In this class, we will seek to answer these two questions by studying some of the sources/concerns of our tradition about the concept of marriage and divorce as we learn about the *Get* (Jewish divorce document). We will address not only the personal/political/religious issues of the day, such as the *Agunah* (the “chained” wife), but also learn about the ancient scribal art of writing a *Get* from Rabbi Goldstein who has spent the last few years preparing to be a *M'sader Gittin*.

**#3 Three Yiddish Short Stories in English Translation**

Yiddish short stories are a fabulous window into a lost world. They record the hopes and struggles of the Jewish people. Their writers were unafraid to lampoon the religious and political establishment. This genre of Jewish literature is often both humorous and poignant. We will read two stories from I. L. Peretz and a third from Joseph Opatoshu that reflect these different roles and goals of the genre.

#### **#4 How *Midrash* Transforms Story Into Drama**

We shall revisit stories of the Biblical Abraham through the textual eyes and analyses of midrashic review and interpretation, while also analyzing the midrashic method itself.

#### **#5 Taking Jewish Taboo and Controversial Subjects Out Of The Closet**

There are things in Jewish life we never like to discuss and so we keep them under wraps because they're controversial and potentially divisive. Here are three such subjects:

*Oct. 19: Are Jews Not Allowed To Voice Complaints To God In Their Prayers?*

*Oct. 26: The Left's Attacks On Israel: A Veiled Protocol Of The Elders Of Zion?*

#### **#6 Jewish Ethical Wills**

You've probably thought about how you will distribute your assets after your death. Have you thought of how and to whom you will bequeath your values and ethics? Many Jews, especially in the Middle Ages, began writing wills, often in Hebrew, as a way of imparting ethical and religious instructions to their children and descendants. We'll examine examples of Jewish ethical wills past and present, and begin creating our own.

#### **#7 The Jewish Love For, and Hate Of, Power**

We Jews have long had an ambivalent relationship with power. While Biblical heroes were strong, robust, and imbued with power, our religious narratives tell us we began as slaves. Even our festivals encapsulate our ambivalence about power and powerlessness. Our later rabbinic and folk traditions exalted powerlessness, as if making peace with life in the Diaspora. Today, with the sovereign State of Israel, the conversation continues: what does it mean to have and exert power? Is there a Jewish way to exercise power?

## **#8 The “Three Pillars” and Their Continuing Influence On Jewish Life Today**

Today’s Jewish observances can be traced back to the Torah and to the three major codes or ‘pillars’ of Jewish law, namely Maimonides’ *Mishneh Torah*, Jacob ben Asher’s *Arba’ah Turim*, and Joseph Caro’s *Shulchan Aruch*. We’ll explore each pillar’s history, context and setting, as well as examine the life of each author. A look at excerpts from each work will help us better understand the breadth of subject matter treated in these codes and how each author understands the transmission of Jewish law through history.

## **#9 The Modern Spiritual Quest for A Meaningful Impersonal God**

Many contemporary Jews cannot accept the notion of a supernatural deity who is personally concerned with the well being of individuals or peoples. They struggle with the relevance of religion in general and Judaism in particular. The premise of this course is that Judaism can be meaningful if we alter the way we envision and think about God. We will explore the writings of Mordecai Kaplan, Judaism’s non-supernaturalism rebbe, Harold Schulweis, Marcia Prager and Michael Strassfeld.

## **#10 *Am Yisrael: The People of Israel/ Eretz Yisrael: The Land of Israel/Medinat Yisrael-The State of Israel***

(L, T, I / B, IN, A)

Today many Jews seek to know something more about who we are, how we relate to one another and to others, and to the Land and State of Israel. Today many ask questions about the nature and character of Jewish peoplehood and Zionism. Do the values and concepts of early Zionism still resonate with us today as American Jews? Will political realities change the face of Zionism? Let’s enter into this discussion by exploring traditional Jewish texts and contemporary Jewish thought.

### #11 Healing and Spirituality

Spirituality, the bedrock of Judaism, is our source of values, compassion, healing, creativity and abundance. Illness can bring a new need for connection with the spirit. This course will examine how some contemporary Jews have found and deepened their spirituality during their encounter with illness. We will also explore the role ritual can play while we're on the journey to health, joy, happiness and meaning.

#### **#15 He Said, She Said: Husband-Wife Relationships in Torah, Talmud and Midrash**

An exploration and study of the intricacies, intimacies, difficulties, humor and joy of Jewish marriage and the loving relationship using classical Jewish texts as our guide. Together with the text we will look into the past and endeavor to gain some understanding for the present. The class will be presented from the unique perspective of a Rabbi-Rabbi, husband and wife team.

#### **#16 Jewish Womenpower**

Women are making wonderful contributions to many spheres of life today. Great Jewish women, however, pre-date contemporary times. Their greatness, as illustrated by the three outstanding Jewish women we will be studying, can be understood through their unique combination of abilities and positions attained in their society. Their contributions can be assessed by what they did for the sake of family and the Jewish community. We will examine the life of the Shunamite woman from the Biblical book of *Kings*, Ima Shalom from the *Talmud*, Gluekl of Hamlin from medieval Europe.

#### **#17 Stories and Chasidic Masters: When A Jew Can Provide No Answer, He At Least Has A Tale To Tell**

In this three part series, Rabbis Saroken and Schwartz will lead us through an exploration of different Chasidic Thinkers including The Baal Shem Tov, the Kutzker Rebbe and The Aish Kodesh (the Rabbi of the Warsaw Ghetto). We will explore the lives of these inspiring and revolutionary Jewish leaders, the stories they told, the stories that others told of them and the lessons they tried to teach with all their heart, soul and might.

## #18 Moses Maimonides

Moses Maimonides was one of the greatest intellectual figures in Jewish history. In this course, we will examine the life, history, thoughts and achievements of the man most Jews know as Rambam. He was responsible for such vital works as *The Guide of the Perplexed* and the *Mishneh Torah* all while living in an Arabic-Islamic world. Maimonides' contributions have been central to Jewish life ever since, as well as to Christian and Muslim thinkers.
